New Faculty Spotlight

The Consortium would like to welcome Drs. Scott Debb and Andrew Franklin, faculty members at Norfolk Statue University. Below are some highlights regarding their academic careers and research interests.

Scott M. Debb, Ed.D.

Dr. Debb received his doctoral training at Argosy University Chicago in Counseling Psychology. Originally from Brooklyn, NY, Dr. Debb moved to the Hampton Roads area about four years ago. Dr. Debb's research interests lie in social justice, conflict studies, quality of life, cross cultural issues, and online learning. His current research projects include the topics of cyber security, juvenile fire-setting, best practices for online teaching (of psychology), minority college student resilience as related to persistence to undergraduate degree completion, and college student mental health.

When asked what career he would've chosen if not for psychology, he replied "Hockey, although that may not be realistic. I wanted to go to college for hockey, but my parents would not allow this (so I went for business and played hockey 5 days a week outside of school, with 18 credits a semester from 7am to 9pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays for a few years). My family genetics are not conducive to a long and productive hockey career, so perhaps it was wise to secure the academic background instead, but all things being equal, it would have been great to go down that road! Maybe coaching hockey would be a more realistic option these days if the whole psych faculty thing falls through!"



Andrew S. Franklin, Ph.D.

Dr. Franklin completed his doctoral training at Virginia State University under the tutelage of Dr. Katrina Walker. While in the Richmond area, he worked on a psychosocial rehabilitation program in Petersburg, VA that provided services to individuals with severe mental illness. He then completed his pre-doctoral internship at the Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters (CHKD) Child Abuse Program (CAP) in Norfolk, Virginia. While working at CAP, he used an evidence based treatment called trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy to assist children and their family members recovering from different types of child abuse. Dr. Franklin joined the Consortium after completing his internship. Dr. Franklin's research interests include individual/personal variables that are related to academic performance. Specifically, he is passionate about conducting research involving spirituality and religious coping methods.
